ALL ACTION ITEMS ARE IN RED AGENDA

- I. Call to Order, Pledge of Allegiance: Amber Cadick, PhD, Board President
- II. Roll Call: Robbin Poore
- I. Minutes to the VCBH Meeting on April 16, 2025: ACTION ITEM: Joni Wise informed the board the draft April minutes had an error. The Environmental Health program Inspect 2 Go was not programmed with the new food code when the state launched the code. Motion to accept the April board minutes made by Dr. Todd, 2nd made by Jeff Depasse. All board members present approved.
- III. Financial Report: Robbin Poore, Bookkeeper; Marc Keilman inquired about where Vigo County stands on the state funds for Health First Indiana for the fiscal years 2026-27. Joni Wise reported that in 2025, we are operating off a little over \$2,400,000 and for 2026-26 it decreases to around \$660,000. Marc inquired about the future of some of our contracted programs. Wise informed we will be able to fund our smaller programs but are unable to fund the judicial RISE Program and Positive Development: Sequenced, Active, Focused, Explicit (SAFE) Program with Chances and Services for Youth and the VC School Corporation. Conversation has occurred between both programs and the VC Commissioner's with the possibility of future funding using the Opioid Settlement funds.
- IV. Health Officer Report & Communications: Dr. Brucken reported the status of the COPA Agreement between Union Hospital and Health Care America (Regional Hospital) as not firm at this time.

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Administrator Report & Communications: Joni Wise shared we added on our last HFI V. contracted partner for 2025, with the usage of 2024 carry-over funds. The New Life Fellowship Compassion Ministries Food Pantry will be able provide fresh meat instead of processed meat for their participants. The pantry is FDA approved. The funding is from 2024 HFI carry-over funds. No other programs will be funded from 2024 carry-over. Our health department participated in a qualitative study on HFI, conducted by the Fairbanks School of Public Health, Indiana University. All 2026 proposed budgets have been submitted to the VC Council and the Indiana Department of Health (HFI only). The mandatory KPI survey and data tracker were submitted to IDOH by June 1st. Marc Keilman inquired whether there is a summary of what we did in 2024 for HFI. Joni said she would punt it out to the board via email. Data is entered into the data tracker twice a year and analysts at IDOH compile the information. This allows for a uniform process for all 92 counties and 2 city health departments for a comprehensive assessment of whether or not HFI funding is moving the needle.. There are 22 Health First Indiana Core Public Health Services. Each local health department assesses what is already being done by other organizations to address the Core Services so there isn't duplication of service. Core services we are addressing as a local health department, KPI's are developed and in our work plan. The plan is on our website. Example:

Vigo County fully meets the State KPI

<u>State KPI:</u> Numbers of counties with access to a trained or licensed case manager and risk assessor in the county and offering weekly lead testing at a location in the county.

<u>Local KPI</u>: Decrease in one year's timeframe, Elevated Blood Lead Lebel (EBLL) to below 5 μ g/dL from the current rate of 58% of children reported with elevated EBLL to 75%. *Baseline data*: The National Electronic Disease Surveillance System (NEDSS) Base System (NBS), IDOH Manifest.

VI. New Business

A. Proposed 2026 Budgets: Joni Wise reported there are no changes from our 2025 General Health Fund budget and the proposed 2026 budget. We didn't receive the federally funded Immunization Grant for the year July 1, 2025, until June 30, 2026. This has been used to hire contracted registered nurses and clerical staff. The remaining Local Health Maintenance Fund and Non-Reverting funds have been presented to the council for consideration of appropriating them for contractual services in 2026. Dr. Todd inquired about building renovation at Griffin Bike Park. HFI funds have been used to assist in building an educational center for health programming at Griffin Bike Park. The request for supplies off the proposed HFI 2026 budget is zero dollars. There will be carry-over funds from 2025 to be applied in 2026 for supplies.

ACTION ITEM The motion to approve the four proposed 2026 budgets was made by Jimmy McKanna, 2nd made by Marc Keilman. All board members present approved.

Standards for Public Health Swimming Pool Facility: Amanda Puller relayed the issues we have had with some of our licensed swimming pools. We would like to amend the pool ordinance and add permitted facilities must have a certified pool operator (Either AFO or CPO). Also, we are proposing the seasonal fee be increased by \$50 and increase fines also. She provided an example of pools that have been closed, and the pool staff open it anyway. Some repeat the same violations again, but not enough to pull their permit. Jimmy McKanna asked how many permitted establishments are there and is it common to require staff to be AFO or CPO certified. We have 42 currently in Vigo County, and yes, Hendricks County has this requirement in their ordinance. He also asked about the cost of the course; the CPO certification is \$200, and it is good for 3 years. The AFO certification is less expensive. Dr. Brucken asked about the start dates for changes and Mandy said by April 1, 2026. Jimmy asked if the new splash pad on Locust Street would need to meet this requirement and the answer is yes. The certification teaches them about chlorine and PH levels and the different waterborne diseases that can occur. ACTION ITEM The motion to approve the ordinance addendums was made by Jimmy McKanna, 2nd made by Marc Keilman. All board members present approved.

Amended Board of Health Fee Collection Ordinance: Amanda Puller asked the board to consider raising the fee for TB tests from \$15 to \$20 to better align with the other Indiana counties TB test cost. Robin Maurer, Clinic Supervisor, passed out a document with how much other counties charge for a TB test. The fee increase will need to go to the VC commissioners for final approval. ACTION ITEM The motion to approve the \$5 fee increase for a TB test was nade by Jimmy McKanna, 2nd made by Marc Keilman. All board members present approved.

Ree policy for out of county birth and death certificates: Loretta Little reintroduced the possibility of raising the cost of out of county birth and death certificates to reflect the cost of the current fees charged in the county in which it originated. The state moved to allowing all county rital statistics division to issue birth and death certificates to any qualifying citizens regardless of the event did not occur within the issuing county. Jimmy McKanna asked if Vital Statistics akes credit or debit cards as a form of payment. Loretta responded that we do not, because for very \$10 certificate issued, the service charge fee from the bank was too costly and the county would lose money. Conversations have occurred with the VC Commissioner's to have an ATM laced in the Annex again. Loretta shared the division does take personal checks. Jimmy IcKanna stated Union Health is looking at acquiring an ATM on premises and can look to see that the process entails. Dr. Todd asked when the last time was, we updated the birth and death certificate fees. Loretta shared it was 2014. The fee increase will be brought to the board as an extion item in October.

rogramming Updates

ital Statistics: Loretta Little relayed they are diverged by the public. There has been an increase in helping ispitals, funeral homes, coroner's office and the public. There has been an increase in helping sencies obtaining birth certificates, at no cost, for individuals in their care. There has also been an crease in issuing out of county certificates.

Vector Control: Mike Grayless shared his staff distributed over 5,200 Skeeter Beater coloring books VC elementaries and private schools. The state is now accepting mosquito samples for West Nile irus (WNV) surveillance, so we have begun our Gravid Trap light trap program. To date, 30 pools amples) have been sent to the state, all with negative results. Gravid traps are specialized devices esigned to attract and capture gravid (pregnant) female mosquitoes by providing an ideal site for nem to lay their eggs. These traps often utilize organic infusions, such as those made from alfalfa ellets to lure mosquitoes. The organic material ferments in water, producing odors that are highly ttractive to gravid mosquitoes. Currently Indiana has 35 positive pools for WNV. 4 bats were sent to ne state lab, and all were negative for rabies. Our 6 summer interns (17- & 18-year-olds) have been ollecting tires for WNV prevention. 4 interns returned from last summer. Tires are a prime breeding ground for WNV mosquitoes. Soon the interns will assist in our expanding catch basin prevention program. In 2024, over 1,500 catch basins were treated. That number will continue to increase due to community growth. Parking lots and subdivisions will install retention ponds and or catch basins to contain water run-off. Catch basins and larvaciding sites are mapped out using the County's GIS system. Larvae samples are examined for identification of species to ensure proper insecticide reatment. He also added our mosquito spraying program has begun. The spraying of adult mosquitoes in Vigo County is as diligent as the weather allows. The adulticiding program consists of five ½ ton pickup trucks and four ATVs (equipped with ultra-low volume cold aerosol fog machines) to spray insecticides throughout the county, as well as the city of Terre Haute, for the control of adult mosquitoes. Jimmy McKanna noted that Clay County, specifically Brazil has already had a positive pool for WNV. Mike is aware of it and knows the location.

Health Education: Shelby Jackson went over the topics covered this quarter by WTHI, WTWO, FOX 59 and the Tribune-Star. She noted the VC Health Department welcomed discarded tires from Greene County following their tornado. Greene County wasn't accepting tires from the tornado debris. She and Amanda Shook-Baker became certified to teach the National Restaurant Association Serv-Safe Food Handlers course. All permitted food establishments are mandated in Indiana to have one Serv-Safe certified staff member. The course is to help staff understand the importance of responsible food service measures. After B & B's closure, there was a need for the program in our community. The course is all day and is offered once a month. She partnered with the Lugar Center for Rural Health, assisting with their HRSA All Babies Matter grant application. The data she brings to the table is from the infant and fetal fatality review teams. She demonstrated to Hicham Rahmouni, Executive Director at the Richard G. Lugar Center for Rural Health, how the two teams' data factor into the application. She also covered the training's she has participated in over the last quarter. She celebrated the ribbon cutting for the first Safe Sleep Trailer in Indiana. Media, elected officials and vested community partners attended the event. An

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80-mile cap has been established for the trailer in usage Indiana. The trailer was displayed and highlighted outside of the IDOH state nurses conference in Carmel. She thanked the Vector Control division staff for building out the trailer, their dedication and support. Without them, it would have been difficult to see this project to fruition. She also virtually presented on the Safe Sleep trailer to all staff at IDOH. There were over 1,100 people at the meeting!

- D. Clinic: Robin Maurer updated the board on the quarterly activities by clinic staff. Recently staff went to Head Start performing lead and hemoglobin tests. Staff will return in September for the same service. IDOH Immunization Division conducted their yearly compliance assessment and the clinic passed with zero infractions. Staff attended the IDOH state nurses conference in Carmel. Katie Mundy, Lead Case Manager and Shelby Jackson, Health Educator also attended. Shelby was able to bring the Safe Sleep Trailer to the conference for attendees to check out. Katie Mundy is learning how to bill for lead testing and case management. The clinic is planning an event called "Fall Vaccine Bash" in September. This will coincide shortly after the VC School Corporation has sent out vaccine compliance notices for children within their system. The event will also host a health fair, a bounce house, face painting (by local licensed tattoo artists), free kettle corn along with the Terre Haute Fire Department demonstrating fire safety. Dr. Cadick observed the 3 cases of histoplasmosis last quarter and asked if we knew the source of origin. No, we don't, for 2 of them and for the other 1, it was caused by goose feces from a pond. Joni Wise shared a document we receive every Thursday from the IDOH epidemiology division. It contains the number of reportable diseases per date and does a comparative analysis for the same week last year. She told the board if they are interested in receiving this document, please let her know via email.
- E. Environmental: Amanda Puller reported the staff has been busy with training, including on-site septic training, rapid response for food and pool workshop, hosted by IDOH. Staff attended the Indiana Environmental Health Association Spring conference. Andrew Martin, Shelley Rubinacci and Amanda Shook-Baker became standardized under the new food code at the end of May. Our on-site septic staff continue to be busy with new installations and replacements of existing systems. Food staff are busy with fairs, festivals and the farmers' market. Staff just completed inspecting over 40 vendors at the county fair.
- F. Social Services: Molly Collett shared all her division's programming is on track, which includes MRT, Seeking Safety and The Change Program; all evidence-based programs. Also, peer recovery coaching continues in the Vigo County Jail. The division continues to collaborate with the judges, which are now court ordering individuals to take the Seeking Safety Program. She highlighted the work by Jeremy Baker, Jail In-Take Coordinator, on connecting resources to those newly released from the jail. His work closes the gap on many barriers for these individuals. She is in the process of creating a document to show the number of people in the programs versus those that aren't and the number of rearrests. The collection of this information is being compiled by the jail matron and commander. Also, by the board's 4th quarter meeting, she will have graphs added to the Social Services Division report. Shelby Jackson and Jeremy Baker created a comprehensive local resource guide to assist the community in connecting resources. The resource guide is on the front page of our website for anyone to use and has been delivered in tri-fold form all over the community. Mark Keilman, on behalf of the board, cited this as great work, exciting and how appreciative he is for what

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we are doing for the community. He asked if there was a specific established timeframe to track participants after their release from the county jail. Currently there isn't an established timeframe, but when there is, it must be manageable. Dr. Todd thanked the division for the work they did and partnering with the jail. Molly shared quarterly meetings are held with the Sheriff and his jail supervisors, judges, public defenders, prosecutors, community corrections, jail attorney and Joni Wise to assess what's working well, areas we could improve in and future strategies. Joni Wise introduced summer intern Katie Turner, who assists in facilitating Seeking Safety and peer recovery coaching in the jail. She is with us for the summer before returning to Michigan to start a master's program. Dr. Cadick shared she had attended the Drug Free Vigo County meeting. Al-Anon. and Alateen numbers are down which isn't good because both programs support families and teenagers who are affected by someone else's alcoholism, usually a family member or close friend.

- Citizens Input: Joni Wise added the message at the top of the agenda and drafted minutes IX. became law as of July 1. She also expounded about the sustainability of programs if HFI funding continues to be reduced or eliminated. She has already begun conversation with the VC Commissioner's about usage of the Opioid Settlement dollars to perpetuate funding for the Social Services Division. Robin-Maurer-was asked to give an update on the status of measles in Vigo County. We currently haven't had a case; hospitals are screening for measles and IDOH will conduct the contract tracing for all diagnosed cases. Mark Keilman asked with the passage of HB 1001, section 127 regarding mental health, do we anticipate the impact on services at Hamilton Center? The new bill states that any non-clinical employee receiving \$400,000 or more in pay at a designated mental health facility will not receive county tax funds after July 1. Currently, Hamilton Center has a non-clinical employee receiving over one million dollars in salary, excluding compensation package. He asked if the health department is being proactive and if the county has provided any funding to Hamilton Center. Joni Wise replied that Hamilton Center's board of directors needs to decide what the organization's priorities are, so therefore have no knowledge of the status of the situation, including if the county has provided funding. Mark Keilman asked what it takes to become one and Dr. Todd states there are numerous steps like staffing requirements and 24-hour services.

Jail Programing

• Intake Coordinator-Focusing on initial screening, preparing, support and collaborates with everyone as they leave the jail and into the first 30 days on reentry. Oversee all the resources, and referrals for individuals leaving the Vigo County Jail.

This position is evolving, and I am looking forward to its growth.

- MRT (in the jail and community corrections)
 -Moral Reconation Therapy: MRT promotes moral reasoning, better decision-making, and improvement of behavior. It is based on the idea that risky and criminal behavior stems from faulty thinking patterns, such as a lack of empathy, distorted perceptions of right and wrong, and impulsivity.
- Peer Coaching: A peer recovery coach is a non-clinical support person who brings valuable lived experience with addiction and recovery, combined with specialized training and supervision, to effectively provide non-clinical recovery support to individuals seeking recovery.
- The Change Program-Interactive Journaling is an evidence-based practice for
 motivating and guiding individuals toward positive life change. It is goal directed,
 client-centered and helps participants modify behavior while progressing through
 the stages of change, precontemplation, contemplation, preparation action and
 maintenance.

To provide more context on The Change Companies, they partner with many justice-involved agencies like the Indiana Dept. of Corrections and Allen County Jail since they are the publishers of risk-need-responsive Interactive Journals. The journals are meant to help facilitators guide their program participants toward positive behavior change (in this case: recidivism reduction and working toward sustainable employment) using evidence-based practices like Motivational Interviewing, CBT, and Expressive Writing.

Happenings:

On July 16th the Health Department hosted the Chirp User group meeting in our council chambers for the IDOH. The Children and Hoosier Immunization Registry Program (CHIRP) is a secure, web-based registry maintained by the Indiana Department of Health. It is designed to permanently store the immunization records for all Indiana residents in an electronic format.

Robin Maurer attended a Virtual Leadership class on July 24th.

August 5th Constance (Coni) Thomas PH.D., RN joined our team in the clinic.

On August 19th the clinic staff went to Head Start and admistered 52 TB test for their yearly testing requirement and then went back to read results on the August 21st.

Starting August 25th we will have students from ISU to get in their clinical hours every Monday and Wednesday. The students visit each division of the Health Department to observe what we do here in Public Health. The Clinic also has a St. Mary's student doing 60 hours at the Health Department starting in October.

Robin Maurer, Deb Sweetings, Libby O'Pell and Coni Thomas have continued training with the IDOH in the NBS system. This is a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)-supported, electronic disease reporting and case management platform used by the Indiana Department of Health (IDOH). The system is used

by public health nurses, epidemiologists, and local health department staff to track and manage reportable infectious diseases within the state.

The Clinic staff along with Katie Mundy, lead case manager went to Head Start to do lead and Hemoglobin testing. We tested a total of 46 preschoolers on September 4th and 12th.

The Fall Vaccine Bash was a success!! With help from all our departments, we were able to see 30 children go through our clinic, vaccinating 22. A total of 43 vaccines were given at this clinic! A HUGE shout out to all who came and helped and also to our vendors! We look forward to next year.

The report on our Vaccine for Children Immunization coverage for the fall of 2025 data is something that the staff at the clinic is very proud of. These percentages are very impressive and represent all of our efforts to vaccinate the children of Vigo and surrounding counties. This report I will hand to the board.

We will continue TB skin testing/reading, vaccine administration including patient/parent education on immunization, inventory/ordering vaccines, scheduling appointments and case management. Precept Deborah Sweetings and Coni Thomas with NBS documentation (animal bites, TB/LTBI cases) understanding/navigating with CHIRP documentation (forecast, immunization record), phone triaging, and the use of community resources for our patient's needs/requests. Continue Court ordered DNA testing through Lab Corp. on the 2nd and 4th Tuesday of each month.
