According to CDC PLACES (2022), two diabetes indicators are meaningfully worse than both the state and nation: diabetes prevalence and diabetes mortality rate. Diabetes prevalence in the WVHC service area is more than 10 percent higher than the state average (14.5% versus 13.1%). For mortality, there are more than 4 excess deaths per 100,000 in the WVHC service area compared to the state (37.8 per 100,000 compared to 33.8 per 100,000). In 2023, 16% (718 unique individuals) of WVHC patients had a diagnosis of diabetes. Having a Diabetes Educator onsite to help these individuals understand their condition, manage it effectively, and live a healthier life would help improve the diabetes mortality rate. This improvement will provide a positive impact on the health of the community. WVCH would also utilize the educator to work with prediabetes populations including at risk individuals with metabolic syndrome, obesity, and other risk factors to decrease prevalence of diabetes.
